CEMETERY FEE INCREASES

The Township Board recently adopted a new Schedule of Fees which included numerous nominal fee increases. The Schedule of Fees is available on the Township's website at www.dewitttownship.org.

Perhaps the most substantive fee increase is for Township cemeteries. The Board determined that the fee increases for cemeteries will not take effect until April 1, 2008 and January 1, 2009. This delay offers residents time to plan for their future burial needs and arrange purchases prior to the increase. A study of our costs prompted the following increases.

DeWitt Township operates two municipal cemeteries. Gunnisonville Cemetery is located on the corner of Wood and Clark Roads. Hurd Cemetery is located on DeWitt Road just north of Stoll Road. Questions and purchase arrangements are handled by the Clerk's Office.

INFORMATION IS THE KEY.....

Sometimes it's those little assumptions that confuse us. The things we don't really think about that may lead to misunderstandings or confusion. In future Newsletters we hope this section will be useful to our residents, clearing up those misunderstandings, eliminating confusion or just providing useful information.

For smoke detectors to work efficiently, maintenance is a must. A chirping smoke detector means the battery is low. A simple remedy is to replace the battery. The International Association of Fire Chiefs promotes that when you change your clocks in the fall to also change your smoke detector batteries.

Maintenance is also the issue for a smoke detector that activates for no apparent reason. Smoke detectors activate when particles move past a sensor or light. One of the most common things that activate a smoke detector is a spider. Spiders or insects will take up residence in the detector. When they move about, they activate the detector. To eliminate this problem use a compressed gas duster used for computers to blow out debris in the detector or use a vacuum cleaner.

PROPOSAL A, TAXABLE VALUE, AND A DECLINING REAL ESTATE MARKET

As you are probably aware, we are in a time of change in the housing market. There is much discussion in the press about declining sales, property values, foreclosures and the economy in general. You might be wondering how this affects your tax bill.

What is Taxable Value?

In 1994, Michigan voters approved the constitutional amendment known as Proposal A. A term known as “Taxable Value” was created as a part of this legislation. Before the enactment of Proposal A, some homeowners were being taxed out of their homes because the value of their home was rising so quickly. The intent of Proposal A was to contain or limit how fast the value used to calculate taxes could increase in any given year and this created what is known as taxable value. Now with Proposal A, your **taxable value is only allowed to increase by the rate of inflation or 5%, whichever is less.**

Since 1994 and the enactment of Proposal A, in many parts of the Township and State, housing values have been increasing much higher than 5% annually. The good news about Proposal A is that even if your home value went up 10%, your taxable value could only go up 5%. The affect of this was to contain or control how much you are paying in property taxes from year to year. Since 1994, the highest rate of inflation used to determine a taxable value increase has been 3.7%. We have never reached the cap of 5%.

For the most part, Proposal A has been very beneficial for Michigan taxpayers. The bad news is that in a slowed real estate market as we have today, we will still see an increase in taxable value by the rate of inflation, even though the market value in many areas is declining. This may seem unfair, but you should remember, in good years, your property value may have increased 8-10% annually, but the increase in your taxable value was capped at the rate of inflation.

What is SEV?

The assessed value or SEV is the “state equalized value” of your home as determined by the Assessor’s Office. This number is calculated by looking at recent sales and other data to reflect 50% of the true market value of your home. Unlike taxable value, this number has no cap. It will go up and down just as the market does; however, you have to remember that there is a delay in the process. Historically, assessments are calculated using sales data from the previous two years. Because of the declining real estate market, the State is now allowing assessors to use sales from a one year period and, in some cases, foreclosure data. This will allow us to better reflect the more recent pricing drops in the market place. However, the State requires assessors to only use **actual** sales that have occurred from October 1, 2006 to September 30, 2007, not the list prices of homes currently on the market. It is also important to remember that the amount that you owe in taxes is generated using the taxable value, not this SEV number.

Will my SEV and Taxable Value ever match?

That depends. If you have lived in your home for a long time, probably not. Remember that your taxable value was going up by 5% or less a year, but your SEV was going up by a higher number in most years. This has caused, for many owners, a significant difference between the SEV and the taxable value for their property since Proposal A began in 1994. In 2007, DeWitt Township’s residential taxable value was 351,731,610 while its SEV was 404,724,700.

For residents who have purchased their property in the last few years, they will have noticed the uncapping affect of Proposal A. When property sells, the assessor must adjust, or uncap, the

taxable value. The taxable value will become equal to the SEV. In the year following a transfer or sale, the process starts over again where the taxable value increases 5% or the rate of inflation, whichever is less. SEV then continues to rise or fall as the market place does.

Will my Taxable Value ever decrease?

Yes. If the SEV falls below your taxable value, then yes. Because of the large gap between the SEV and taxable value, we will need to have a very long down turn in the housing market before this will happen for most property owners. It is possible for some who have recently purchased their homes to see this happen sooner. Under certain circumstances, the Township assessor can make adjustments to the SEV, but the taxable value cannot be adjusted since it is a formula determined by Proposal A.

The following chart illustrates how SEV and taxable values move in both a positive and declining real estate market. **Example:** \$200,000 home purchased in year one

Summary

In summary, for many years homeowners have benefited from Proposal A. It has capped or limited the value used to calculate annual taxes to a level that is more sustainable. Proposal A does not work as well in a declining market because property taxes are driven by the taxable value, which increases annually by the rate of inflation, determined annually by the State of Michigan. As a result, taxable value often lags behind the state equalized value and can increase even though there may be a decrease in the state equalized value.

WHAT ARE ALL THOSE COLORED FLAGS FOR?

We have all seen those colored flags sticking in the ground. They are placed by locating crews in order to mark the position of underground utilities so that a repair or construction operation on one service doesn't interfere with others. Here's a guide so you know what each different color means:

RED – Electric Power Lines, Cables, Conduit and Lighting Cables

ORANGE – Communications, Cable TV, Alarm or Signal Lines

YELLOW – Natural Gas, Petroleum

BLUE – Water, or Irrigation Lines

GREEN – Sewers and Drain Lines

PINK – Temporary Survey Markings

WHITE – Proposed Excavations

Flags frequently supplement color-coded surface markings on curbs or lawns made with paint or chalk to indicate the location and route of buried lines. Before you dig, don't forget to call Miss Dig at (800) 482-7171.

DEWITT ROAD

Many of you may have noticed a number of trees that have been removed along Turner and DeWitt Roads in the southern part of the Township. The Capital City Airport (CCA) has been performing this work along their flight path in preparation for the relocation of DeWitt Road. CCA has received federal funds and will be adjusting DeWitt Road to curve further to the east between Sheridan and State Roads. According CCA, this work will allow them to expand their runways. CONSTRUCTION UPDATE

For those that may not have seen the short article in the DeWitt-Bath Review, both the Township Hall and the Fire Station located on Herbison Road sustained roof damage due to severe thunderstorms. Both roof repair projects are now complete. Replacing these roofs was recommended by the Township's insurance carrier who fully covered the replacement cost.

Tim Hortons Restaurant, located on the west side of Business US 127, just north of Herbison Road, is now open for business. Stop in for some fresh coffee, doughnuts, beverages or sandwiches.

The project south of Clark Road is a new Auto Body Credit Union branch. The credit union is expected to be ready to serve your needs in May or June of 2008.

Mexico to Go (Corner of Sheridan Road and Business US 127) is also now open for business.

Commercial businesses continue to be interested in locating and expanding the availability of services to our residents.

CLINTON COUNTY WASTE MANAGEMENT UPCOMING EVENTS

The Clinton County Department of Waste Management is pleased to announce 2008 special recycling programs. Clean Community Events will be held on April 26 in St. Johns and October 4 in DeWitt Township. Items accepted include household and small business hazardous waste, motor oil and antifreeze, electronics such as computer systems and TVs, scrap metal and Freon appliances, tires, bulky waste and household junk, reusable household items and clothing, and non-reusable clothing and textiles for recycling.

Events are also planned to collect books for reuse and/or recycling. These events will be held on April 3 in St. Johns, April 4 in DeWitt and April 5 at the East Lansing DPW located at State and Brown Roads. Items accepted include hard cover and soft cover books, telephone books and magazines. Library groups will be on hand to sort through books to ensure those that can be are reused.

Clinton County also sponsors a number of on-going collection programs for household batteries, cell phones, athletic shoes, and ink jet/toner cartridges. They also coordinate a sharps program to distribute specially designed containers for used sharps as well as facilitate safe disposal of full containers. 2008 ASSESSMENTS

Residents and taxpayers should receive their 2008 assessment notices the first week in March. Unless there has been construction or a transfer of ownership during 2007, your taxable value

will not increase more than **2.3%**, which is the rate of inflation for the 2008 assessment year. The notice will show an equalized value and a taxable value for your property. The **assessed or state equalized value (SEV)** is adjusted annually to reflect 50% of fair market value. The **taxable value** is the actual amount on which your property taxes are based.

BOARD OF REVIEW – Will meet the week of March 10, 2008. The specific times for appointments will be printed on the assessment notice, as well as published in the DeWitt-Bath Review. If you have a question regarding your assessment or wish to schedule an appointment with the Board of Review, please call the Assessing Office at 669-6494 after March 1, 2008. Often we are able to answer your questions so an appointment isn't necessary.

TAX INFORMATION

2007 winter tax bills were mailed December 1, 2007. This tax is due by February 14, 2008. If you deferred your summer tax, it will also be due on February 14, 2008. After that date, additional interest and fees apply. Late tax payments will be accepted at the Township office until February 29, 2008. If you have an escrow set up with your mortgage company, your tax bill was sent to them if they requested it. If you didn't receive a tax notice and you should have, please contact the Treasurer's Office at 668-1411.

On March 1, 2008, delinquent **real** property taxes will be turned over to the Clinton County Treasurer's Office for collection. After that date, questions and payments should be directed to the Clinton County Treasurer's Office at (989) 224-5280.

All **personal** property taxes must be paid to the DeWitt Township Treasurer's Office, 1401 W. Herbison Road, DeWitt MI 48820. It is against the law for personal property taxes to become delinquent. If you have personal property taxes due, please remit payment. If you have any questions or need assistance, call the Treasurer's Office at 668-1411.

AN OVERWHELMING RESPONSE!

The Township Community Center was busting at the seams on the evening of October 24, 2007. The Township hosted residents, business owners and others interested in the future of the Old-27 corridor and the neighborhoods in the southern portion of the Township. Such an overwhelming number of people responded to our invitation to tell us their concerns and to brainstorm ideas for the future that we had to bring in extra chairs and tables to fill every nook and cranny. We want to extend our sincere appreciation to those who gave their time to this important workshop and for the outstanding comments and participation.

The comments will be used as we continue our work on the South Central Area Plan. The Plan is a study of the area roughly bounded by Sheridan Road at the southern border of the Township, and Stoll Road at the north end. The east and west boundaries of the area are Wood Road and DeWitt Road. The purpose of the study is to identify the "positives" and the "negatives" in the southern area of the Township. Our goal is to develop a plan to build on the positives and reduce the negatives so that new investment will grow, helping to protect and enhance the property values of the homes and businesses in this part of our community.

If you were unable to join us at the visioning workshop, you can read a summary of the session on the Township’s website, www.dewitttownship.org, under “News and Information.” If you don’t have access to the Internet, a summary can be obtained by visiting the Planning Department or calling us at 669-6576.

The next step in the process is to identify policies and programs that can be used to accomplish the vision expressed at the public workshop. The Planning Commission expects to hear preliminary recommendations from the consultant in early February. We hope to have a draft Plan for review and comments by the middle of 2008. An update from the DEWITT PUBLIC LIBRARY BOARD

Library Board continues to explore options for the future.

In 1998, DeWitt Township, DeWitt City, and the Library partnered to purchase our existing Library building and we have since prospered at the Schavey Road location. Circulation in our first full year was 93,594 items, with the 2007 year end circulation total being 222,059. All that growth is in spite of the fact that the DeWitt Library has a “small” collection compared to other Class V Libraries in the State. The number of participants in our Library programs borders on staggering considering the size of our facility.

And therein lies the problem – we have a successful library with significant space problems. For every book brought into the facility, one must be removed. The adult section suffers in many ways, from reduced collection numbers to a somewhat “unappealing” adult atmosphere. Rental of outside storage space provides a band-aid, but does not solve our space problems.

As you can see, this success leaves the Library Board with issues to resolve. For over two years, the Board has been working, with the help of community leaders and library patrons, to find solutions. Investigation has determined that expansion at our present site is not possible. A Needs Assessment Study was contracted and accomplished, with over 40 community members assisting the Breton Group in their final evaluation. Five visioning sessions were held with broad community input. A model has been built showing the results of the two year public visioning process.

Land has been proposed as a donation for a Library facility. However, a new Library will necessitate a ballot proposition asking the voters of the district to approve a millage. Asking for a new tax is never an easy decision. The Library Board continues to consider options. Finding cost effective solutions to the challenge of offering adequate Library services to our community is at the forefront of every discussion. (www.dewittlibrary.org)

Currently, our Library operates primarily with tax dollars (1/2 mill) from the property owners residing within the City of DeWitt, DeWitt Township, and the DeWitt School District portion of Watertown Township.

FIVE THINGS WE CAN DO TO PROTECT OUR WATERSHEDS

1. **Wash Your Car on the Lawn or Direct the Water to the Lawn** – Wash your car only when necessary; use a bucket to save water. Alternatively, go to a commercial carwash that uses water efficiently and disposes of runoff properly.
2. **Maintain All Vehicles – Eliminate Leaks and Spills** – Recycle used oil and antifreeze by taking them to service stations and other recycling centers. Never put used oil or other chemicals down storm drains or in drainage ditches. One quart of oil can contaminate up to two million gallons of drinking water.
3. **Recycle and Dispose of Household Chemicals Properly** – Many household chemicals are toxic. Buy wisely. Buy products labeled biodegradable, non-toxic, non-phosphorus, and non-surfactant. Use non-toxic substitutes wherever possible. Soap, baking soda, vinegar, washing soda, ammonia, borax, alcohol and cornstarch may be used to lift out spots and stains, deodorize, polish wood or metal, disinfect, scrub, repel pests, clean pets, wash and starch clothes and to perform other household tasks. Take unwanted household chemicals to hazardous waste collection centers; do not pour down the drain or on the ground. Use low-phosphate or phosphate-free dishwasher detergents.
4. **Inspect and Maintain Septic Systems and Sewers** – Periodic removal of solids in septic tanks will ensure long-term and cost-effective service. Improper maintenance may cause a sewage backup into the home or sewage discharge onto the yard. Septic systems should be inspected every three years. Septage should be removed from all tanks and tank compartments when: the top of the sludge layer is less than 12 inches below the bottom of the outlet baffle, or the bottom of the scum layer is less than three inches above the bottom of the outlet baffle. To maintain a septic system, you should know what it is, where it is, how it works and when it should be serviced. If you have any questions or problems, call your local health department.
5. **Join a Watershed Organization** – Participate in clean-up activities in your neighborhood. Write or call your elected representatives to inform them about your concerns and encourage legislation to protect water resources.
